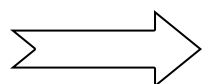

Chanting the Wai Khru

Most practitioners of *nuad boran* are familiar with the traditional prayer that is offered to the founding father of traditional Thai medicine, Jivaka Kumarabhacca. This mantra, passed down over many generations in the Pali language, is often recited aloud by students, practitioners and schools before the start of a Thai massage class, or even silently before beginning a Thai massage session. The Thai Healing Alliance has prepared this three-note melody so it can be made available to the international Thai massage community. It is annotated in an easy, 3-line format that can be followed by everyone.
